



Carl Quintin Anderson, 32°, was born on July 10, 1927 in Wagon Mound, New Mexico and graduated from high school in Raton in 1944. He launched his radio career as a disc jockey for KFUN in Las Vegas, New Mexico. Following a tour of duty in B29's with the Air Force, he attended engineering schools in Chicago and Kansas City. He married Marilyn Edith Kelly on August 17, 1947, and three daughters were born of their union. Brother CQ came to Grand Junction as an engineer and radio announcer with KFXJ, later to become KREX, in 1948. Working with Rex Howell, Anderson helped expand the reach of television to Montrose, Durango and Glenwood Springs. He was general manager of KREY television in Montrose for several years, before becoming president and general manager of XYZ Television Inc. in 1968. He was the Colorado State Broadcaster of the year in 1983 and later became president of the Colorado State Broadcasting Association. He also served as a member of the Governor's Commission on Broadcasting in 1978 and 1979. Brother Carl was a past President of the Chambers of Commerce for both Montrose and Grand Junction, and the Rotary Club of Grand Junction, served on an advisory board for Mesa State College, and was a longtime member of the First United Methodist Church. He was raised a Master Mason in Monroe Lodge #63 on April 4, 1965, and received the degrees in the Scottish Rite from the Grand Junction Scottish Rite Bodies on October 27, 1965. He was a member of El Jebel Shrine, a member of the Royal Order of Jesters. an active rider in the Shrine Scooter Patrol, and served as treasurer for many years for the Mariners, the Tee-offs, and the Scooter Patrol, as well as being an editor of the Fez-n-Tassel newsletter. In 1973 he was President of the Western Colorado Shrine Club and in 1983 he was honored as the Club's "Shriner of The Year." His wife of 49 years, Marilyn, preceded him in death. After being burned out by Yankee troops during the Civil War, the clan moved to Miller County, Missouri and started a new life. His male ancestors going back to his great-great grandfather were all Masons. His great-grandfather was raised in the field two days before the battle of Pea Ridge in Arkansas by his Commanding Officer, General Nathan Bedford Forrest who constituted a Lodge from his staff to raise members of his command who desired to see the light. In 1935 he moved to the Hartville, Wyo., area as a teacher in a small school for two terms, where he met and later married Theodora C. Brott, the mother of his five children. During World War II he joined the Carpenters' and Millwrights' Union to work on government jobs in Wyoming, Idaho, Oregon and Utah. Following a divorce in 1965 he married Estella Parrott Long in 1966. He permanently relocated to Delta in December 1975.
