some exercises

1. He asked whether they would be able to defend themselves (ἀμύνομαι) in case of an enemy attack (προσβάλλω).
2. Euphiletus clearly demonstrated that he killed Eratosthenes in self-defence, not with any intention to murder (φονεύς, φονεύω).
3. I would like to ask you, gentlemen, whether you are capable of judging fairly, now that you have seen the wretched defendant's wife and children.
4. He was brought to trial (κρίνομαι) on charge of cutting down his neighbour's fig tree (συκία) but was acquitted.
5. The Persians could see that the Greeks had laid waste (τέμνω) to this territory and decided they had to repel any further attacks.
